For the morning 'practice' round we will again play in teams of three with scoring as follows:

Holes 1-3

Only the best stableford score counts toward the team total

Holes 4-6

Only the two best stableford scores counts toward the team total

Holes 7-9

ALL three stableford scores count toward the team total

On nearly every golf day there seems to be a group or two that loses several holes and holds up the rest of the field behind them which is not fair on your fellow society members.

'Honour' Etiquette

Can we request that the etiquette of whoever has 'the honour' be relaxed and whoever is ready to play goes first. If a longer hitter has to wait whilst it would be safe for a shorter hitter to play, let the shorter hitter go first. This is to apply both on the tee and on the fairway.

It is the responsibility of the lowest handicapped player in each group to take charge of the pace of play. If you have lost ground, you need to let the group behind through and speed up your pace of play.
